

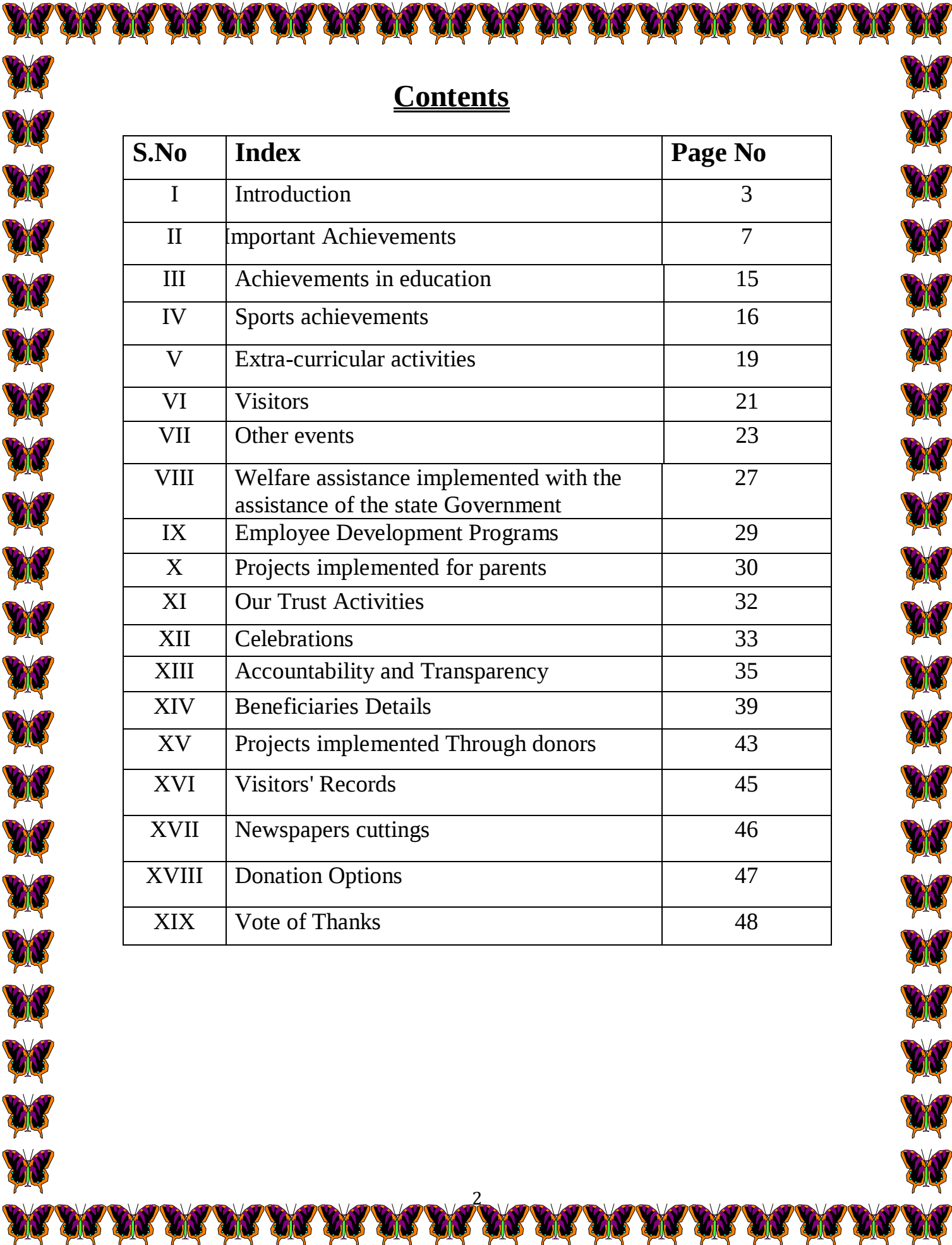

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ANNUAL REPORT (2024 -2025)

I. Introduction:

Our Ritham Trust has completed 21 yeas successfully and stepping towards 22th year. Every year Our students establish their talents in academic, Sports, Co-curricular activities and thus add credit to our institution. Some of them join in normal schools and continue their studies and join in jobs according to their ability. We proudly submit our trust's 21th year achievements.

1. Origin:

The Founder Mr. P. S. Kathiresan is a retired headmaster from Tamilnadu govt. service and was awarded 'Best Teacher' by both the Central Government and Tamilnadu state government has started 'Ritham Special School' with his son Mr. K. Venkataramanan's best effort.

Mr. K. Venkataramanan is basically a physiotherapist. Daily he used to see the mentally/physically challenged kids and the mental agony and the hardship the parents of such children face. He also comes across the practical difficulties and inferiority complex of these children. In 2004 he came across P. David Samraj a MR+CP kid. The kid is really good in memorizing subject but not able to relate words and read it. He looked his positive ability and wants to train him. But where and how? This question made him to open **Ritham Special School**. Ritham started with 4 kids in 2004. Now in the year of 2024-25 more than Seventy seven students are benefitting. He is willing to educate as many children as he can.

Begun as a Special School only, now it is growing with Early Intervention centre, Vocational Training centre, Sheltered Workshop, Learning Centre, Autism Treatment Centre and Outpatient Department centre.



We are travelling towards the effective special education available to the rural, poor and underprivileged special students as like as the urban area special students for the past 20 years continuously.



2. Our Mission And Vision:



The main and primary object of the Trust shall be to develop confidence in the minds of all type of physically and mentally challenged children and motivating them to face the daily activities without others help. The above said object shall applicable to all students irrespective of Caste, Creed, Color, Language, Sex and Religion.



3. Our Objectives:



a) To offer rehabilitation to physically and mentally challenged persons and to provide medical and other health facilities to all type of physically and mentally challenged poor, underprivileged and rural children.



b) Giving them vocational training to earn and lead a decent life. Providing them vocational training to lead life of equality and with dignity in the society they live. c) We provide counseling to the parents about the problems faced by their physically and mentally challenged child and the need of rehabilitation to lead a life of equality in the society.



d) To create awareness among the members of the society about the formidable challenges faced by the physically and mentally challenged and to encourage their participation in all fields.



e) Educating parents about teaching the household chores and daily activities which would help the physically and mentally challenged to lead an independent life.



f) Teaching the members of society about the measures to prevent Disability in near future.





g) Making the physically and mentally challenged & their family members to know about the Government's welfare and assistance.



h) To identify and diagnose at the very beginning of the problems, take steps to give complete rehabilitation and.



i) To develop the Rehabilitation centre working as a day care centre at present to a fully-fledged residential home in future.



j) To increase the education level of all kind of physically and mentally challenged children using the Teaching & Learning materials [TLM] specially designed for them [Special Education].



k) Our foremost objective is to give 'Inclusive Education' to the improved & better learned children in our school.



l) Find out the mild mentally challenged children and give training and encourage to write the State Government ESLC and SSLC examinations.



m) We are forming the Sheltered workshop for above 18 years Moderate Mentally Physically Challenged children and do the vocation under a supervisor.



4. Our achievements in the past 20 years:



1. It is the second recognized special school in our Virudhunagar District.



2. For the first time in south Tamilnadu, our institute has joined with Vocational Rehabilitation Centre (VRC), Chennai organizing the free tailoring programme.



3. Every year we won many prizes at state and district level sports and events.



4. This institution has the support and relationships with the National Institutions like National Trust, NIEPID and NIPMED.





5. We received the transparency award from Guide Star India continuously.

6. Giving special education for maximum number of poor, underprivileged and rural students.

7. To identify the mild mentally challenged students and prepare them to write the 8th and 10th public examinations.

8. The Japan government has given grant for the construction project for our school.

II. Important Achievements:

1. Selected as one of the top 30 organizations in the nationally conducted SVP Fast Pitch fundraising competition;

SVP Fast serves as a platform to build communication and storytelling skills. It helps organizations like ours share their growth journey (story) and raise funds from various donors and audiences. Our organization participated in this initiative and was selected as one of the top 30 organizations.



The second round of selections was conducted online on November 19 and in person on November 29.



2. Participated in competitions held for identifying top-performing organizations and was selected as one of the top ten organizations:

Our organization applied for the N.S. Hema Memorial Awards in recognition of outstanding organizations. It was selected as one of the top 10 organizations. As part of the evaluation process to identify the top three winners, an assessment was conducted at our organization on September 6.



3.Our Head was selected as the District Coordinator for Special Olympics Bharat in Virudhunagar:

On April 23, during the election conducted by Special Olympics Bharat to appoint representatives for the Virudhunagar district, our Head was elected as the District Coordinator.



4. Received the 'Paripoorani Award' from the Rajapalayam Rotary Club King City organization:

An award ceremony honoring accomplished women was organized by the Rajapalayam Rotary Club King City at Ananda Garden on March 19. In this event, our faculty member Mr. S. Asiyabenasir was selected for the 'Paripoorani Award' under the Social Welfare category.



5. Free Medical Camp:

A free medical camp was organized by Smile Foundation for the students and teachers of our institution. A total of 37 students, 13 teachers, 4 other staff members, and 3 parents participated and benefited from the camp.



6. Receiving the Young Competitor Award:

Dance and singing competitions were conducted by the organization Drzya. Ten students from our institution participated online. On September 19, K. Mirudula won the 'Young Contestant Award' in the dance competition.



7. Conducting a study on students learning abilities through an external organization:

The methods used to teach our organization's students, the ways in which their weaknesses are identified, and the details of tracking their progress were studied through Rangammal Charitable Trust on March 6.



8. Selection for the Special Olympics National Level Talent Screening Competition:

The district-level talent screening competitions for the Special Olympics World Games 2027 were held on October 16 at the CSI Special School in Satchiyapuram, Sivakasi. The event was inaugurated by the District Differently Abled Welfare Officer, Mr. T. Srinivasan. Fourteen students from our institution participated in the sports competitions, and six of them were selected for the state-level talent screening competition.



The state-level football and softball competitions were held at R.K. Mahal in Thuraiamangalam, Perambalur on November 26, and the athletics competitions were conducted at Alagappa University, Karaikudi on December 19. In the state-level softball throw event, S. Gurunithish emerged victorious and was selected for the next level of the talent screening competition.



The next level of the talent screening competitions was held at Vallaba Vidyalaya CBSE School in Madurai from January 3 to 5. Due to his outstanding performance, S. Gurunithish was selected for the national-level talent screening competition.



9.Achievement by winning in the state-level sports competitions for the Chief Minister's Trophy:

The district-level sports competitions for the Chief Minister's Trophy were held on September 19 at the Virudhunagar District Sports Stadium. Thirty students from our institution participated in the event. Among them, three students were selected for the state-level sports competitions. Additionally, our students achieved notable success by winning four second prizes and three third prizes.



The state-level sports competitions were held at the Tamil Nadu Physical Education and Sports University in Melakottaiyur, Chengalpattu—on October 20 for individuals with intellectual disabilities, and on October 23 for individuals affected by cerebral palsy. In the shot put event for participants with cerebral palsy, J. Amala achieved a remarkable feat by securing third place at the state level. As a reward for this achievement, our student was awarded a cash prize of 50,000/-.



On October 30, Virudhunagar District Collector Mr. V.P. Jayaseelan, I.A.S., personally invited and congratulated the student.



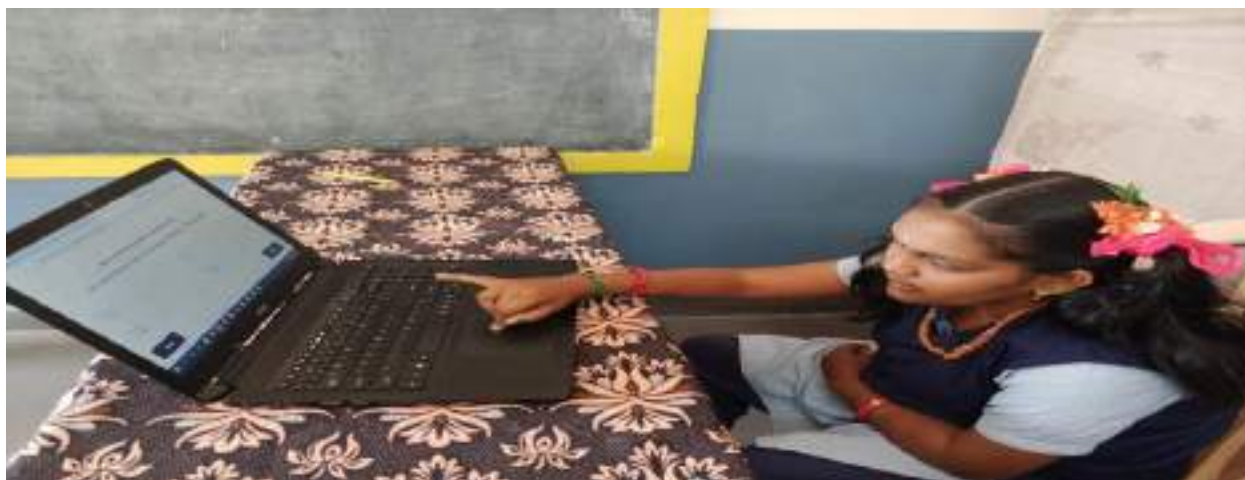
10.Receiving the award from the Honorable Deputy Chief Minister:

In the district-level sports competitions for the Chief Minister's Trophy, our student I. Muniyasamy secured third place in the 100-meter race in the boys' category. On October 1, the Honorable Deputy Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu and Minister for Sports, Mr. Udhayanidhi Stalin, presented him with a certificate and medals.



11.Participation in the state-level quiz competition and advancement up to the semi-finals:

The state-level quiz competition organized by THE SPASTICS SOCIETY OF TAMILNADU (SPASTN) in collaboration with Quizable Foundation was conducted online on August 8. Five students from our institution participated in the event, and M. Uma Bharathi advanced to the semi-finals.



12.Participation in the national-level art and science exhibition competitions.

Six special schools from Tamil Nadu were selected to participate in the national-level art and science exhibition competitions, organized online through the ILAP (Innovative Learning Activities and Projects) platform. As one of the six selected schools from Tamil Nadu, students from our special school took part in the competition held online on December 17.



III.Achievements in education:

1.Organizing drawing competitions for our students within the school premises through social organizations:

Drawing competitions were conducted for our students on October 15 through the Inner Wheel Club of Rajapalayam Sanjeevi Hills.



2.Participation in an exhibition to sell products made by vocational training students:

Students participated in the "Namma Pasanga Angadi" held at Vidyasagar in Kotturpuram, Chennai on September 28 and 29, and also in the camp organized for volunteers by the Chennai Volunteers organization at Loyola College, Chennai on October 10. In both events, they sold the products made by the vocational training students.



IV.Sports achievements:

1.Participation in the Special Olympics state-level qualifying round talent screening competition:

The state-level qualifying talent screening competition for the Special Olympics Bocce sports event was held on August 8 in Dharmapuri. One male student and one female student from our institution, who were selected for the Virudhunagar district team, participated in the event.



2.Winning at the district-level competition:

In celebration of the International Day of Persons with Disabilities, district-level sports competitions were held on November 22 at the Virudhunagar District Sports Development Authority. In this event, six students from our institution secured first place, and two students secured second place. All the students who won first place were selected for the state-level competition.



3.Participation in the state-level football competition:

The state-level football competitions were held on August 14 and 15 at Ramakrishna Mission Vidyalyaya in Coimbatore. Three students from our institution, who were selected for the Virudhunagar district team, participated in the event. Our district team advanced up to the quarter-finals.



4.Participation in the National Abi Olympics Competition:

Through the Abi Olympics, non-sport competitions were held among the southern states on October 17 and 18 at St. Joseph's University in Bengaluru. Two students from our institution participated in the painting and cooking competitions.



5.For the first time, participation in sports competitions for wheelchair-bound students affected by cerebral pals:

Through the Aishwarya Natarajan Sports Competition, Bocce sports events for individuals with cerebral palsy and intellectual disabilities (Cerebral Palsy + Intellectual Disabilities) were held at Vidyasagar, Chennai from 24.10.2024 to 25.10.2024. Eight students from our school participated in this competition for the first time. Our students qualified in the preliminary rounds and advanced to the semi-finals.



V. Extra-curricular activities:

1.Participation in national-level drawing competitions and winning a prize:

The national-level drawing competition was conducted by the United Schools Organization of India (USO) on April 22. Our school student, P. Kannan, secured third place in the 'High Support Category'.



Similarly, E-Mime competitions were held on February 4, 2025. Six students from our school participated and were selected to advance to the next stage of the competition.



The second round of the competition was conducted live online on January 20th, in the presence of official referees.



2. Our students also participated in dance competitions organized by other institutions, showcasing their talent and enthusiasm:

Our students actively participated in the Kadamba Festival held in Madurai on June 29th and 30th. Additionally, they took part in the art competition organized by Gaumaram Prasanthi Academy as part of INQ-Fest 2024 (TALENTIA), held in Coimbatore on December 7th.



VI. Visitors:

1. Visiting by people from other organizations:

On April 10th, Mrs. Sukuna Sridhar, the Founding Director of Swastha Vocational Training Center in Chennai, visited our institution and observed the progress of our students.





2.Kalasalingam University students visit:

On September 4th, Master of Social Work (MSW) students from Kalasalingam University visited our institution as part of their academic engagement and field exposure.



3.Members of the Rotary Club visited our organization and extended their support by providing welfare assistance to our students:

On August 13th, members of the Rotary Club visited our organization and provided essential equipment for vocational training students. On August 28th, they donated school bags, naturally made soaps, sweets, and monthly financial support for one of our students. On November 25th, they contributed sports equipment for student recreation, along with seeds for shade-giving trees. Additionally, on March 20th, in observance of World Sparrow Day, they provided equipment to support the nesting of sparrows.



4.Srivilliputhur Inner Wheel Club members visit and provide welfare assistance:

On October 14th, the Inner Wheel Club of Golden Srivilliputhur Friends visited our school and provided essential equipment to the vocational training students.



VII.Other events:

1.Honoring our schoolgirls at a function organized by Virudhunagar Disabled Persons Association:

In observance of World Disability Day, a program titled Sangamam was organized by the Virudhunagar District Disabled Persons Association on December 1st at the Thiruvalluvar Mandram in Rajapalayam, to advocate for the rights of persons with disabilities and their caregivers. During the event, two students from our institution, who had won in the district-level sports competitions held in honor of World Disability Day, were felicitated with shawls in recognition of their achievements.



2.Receiving donations from other social organizations:

On October 1st, SON OF PRIDE received donations from the P.R. Vijayakumar Foundation, and on December 3rd, from the Parantha Foundation. These contributions were directed towards covering the expenses of our students.



3.Collaborating with other organizations to improve capacity for the organization:

From April to June, the Dhwani Foundation conducted capacity-building training sessions for our organization. Our administrators, principal, and second-level leadership team actively participated in these sessions to strengthen organizational effectiveness.



On July 16th, second-level leaders from our organization participated in a training program held in Madurai, organized for institutions across the southern districts.



They visited our institution on September 26th and conducted interviews with the principal, trustees, and other faculty members.



4. Celebrating the Deputy Chief Minister's birthday on our campus:

On the occasion of the birthday of the Honorable Deputy Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu, Mr. Udhayanidhi Stalin, Rajapalayam MLA Mr. S. Thangapandian, along with members of the organization, visited our institution. They celebrated the event by cutting a cake and distributing sweets to the students.



5. A survey was conducted to assess the progress and experiences of students currently undergoing internships:

On July 20th, Mrs. Mary Prabhakaran and Mr. Manikandan from the Anbalaya Institute in Chennai visited our institution to inspect and evaluate the progress of our vocational training students placed in internships.



6. Receiving equipment donations:

Donors generously contributed various essential items to support our students and institutional needs. These included learning materials, sports shoes, equipment for preparing an art exhibition, materials for constructing a roof over the handwashing area, an incense-making machine for vocational training students, and books for the library.

On April 5th, Mr. Jayaprakash, the District Disability Welfare Officer, visited our institution and conducted an inspection of the school and classrooms.



3.Attending meetings:

In celebration of World Disabled Persons Day, a meeting was held on November 15th at the Virudhunagar Disabled Persons Office, chaired by Mr. Srinivasan, the District Disabled Persons Welfare Officer. Our

school principal participated in the event and shared his insights during the session.

From July to March, our institution's teachers and staff received continuous training aimed at enhancing their professional skills and overall effectiveness.



2.Attending teacher training courses:

On June 27th and 28th, three teachers from our institution participated in a state-level coaching camp held in Madurai by Tamil Nadu Special Olympics Bharat.

Three teachers from our institution participated in a workshop on creating learning and teaching materials, held at Amar Seva Sangam in Ayakudi, Tenkasi, on March 7th, 8th, and 9th.



X. Programs implemented for parents:

1. Parents meeting:

Parents' meetings were conducted on April 6th, September 14th, and February 8th at our institution to discuss student progress and strengthen school-home collaboration.



2.Parent Teacher Meeting:

Parent-teacher meetings were held on June 21 and August 19.



3.Mental health counseling awareness program for parents:

During the parents' meeting held on April 6th, an awareness session on mental health counseling for parents was conducted under the leadership of Mrs. Syamala, Rajapalayam Atma Prasara Coordinator. XI. Our Trust Activities:

1. Trust Meeting:

Meetings were conducted on our campus on June 22nd, September 28th, December 28th, and March 22nd to review institutional activities and plan future initiatives.

1.Celebrating Yoga Day and Kamaraj's Birthday:

Independence Day and Republic Day were celebrated at our institution on August 15th and January 26th, respectively. On both occasions, our Head of the Institution hoisted the national flag and delivered a special address to the students and staff.

The 21st Sports Festival was celebrated at our school on March 21, 2025, in honor of World Down Syndrome Day. The event commenced with the lighting of the Olympic flame by our national-level winning students, in the presence of special guests, marking the official start of the festival.

World Beyond Thinkers Day and World Disabled Persons Day were celebrated in a grand manner at our institute on April 4th and December 4th, respectively, with various programs highlighting the talents and contributions of our students.



5. Other Festivals:

A series of important celebrations were held at our institution throughout the year. The school building inauguration ceremony took place on June 27th, followed by Teachers' Day on September 5th, Saraswati Pooja on October 10th, Diwali on October 29th, Children's Day on November 14th, and a combined celebration for Christmas and New Year on December 23rd. The Pongal festival was celebrated on January 10th, Foundation Day on February 4th, and Women's Day on February 10th. Special guests participated in these celebrations, adding to the significance and success of each event.
